Townhall's 3rd Annual Youth Summit

Townhall II invited all Portage County High Schools to participate in the 3rd Annual Portage County Youth Summit at Maplewood Career Center. Students from six different schools attended with the intention of becoming leaders within their school and promoting positive changes throughout their districts.



Joe Markiewicz, National Youth Trainer, joined as our guest speaker from Building Stronger Communities to share information about the needs of youth in Portage County. He educated the students on data to prioritize risk factors that lead to problem behaviors such as substance abuse, mental health issues, truancy, bullying, and violence. He was able to provide examples of positive social norming campaigns to get the students thinking about what they could do to improve their school environment.

Each school was given time to brainstorm ideas that they would like to see implemented and developed a student action plan. Our prevention specialist, Tiffany Martin, will be working with these groups to help them bring their ideas to life! The top priorities were similar between the schools which included addressing mental health needs, increasing parent involvement, childhood trauma, suicide, violence and drinking and vaping use among teens. Each student received a t-shirt designed using words that youth feel defines a leader. The event was made possible by a grant from the Ohio Department of Health.

Special thanks to Karyn Kravetz from the Mental Health and Recovery Board of Portage County and Commissioner Sabrina Christian-Bennett for speaking to the students about the importance of creating positive changes for our community. We would also like to thank Kent Roosevelt High School, Streetsboro High School, Waterloo High School, Southeast High School, Ravenna High School and Rootstown High School staff and students for participating and making it a successful day.

Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month

Did you know that February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month? This is an annual, monthlong event that focuses on advocacy and education to stop dating abuse before it starts.

Dating violence is more common than you may think. It affects millions of young people in the United States and can take place in person, online, or through technology. Teen dating violence has a major impact on lifelong health, but the good news is that it is preventable.

Townhall II offers an evidence-based program adapted from Safe Dates called Stand Up to all Portage County middle and high schools. This program meets with students for 5 days discussing types of relationships (safe and supportive vs. unsafe), types of abuse, consent, and bystander interventions. This program served over 1,800 students last school year and offers support, resources and referrals as needed.
